
Safty Officer's Corner: Ernie Padgette

Accident Prevention 101

There are a lot of ways to prevent an accident from happening. One way is kind of like the old adage about "How To Win A Gunfight". The answer: "Don't show up". If you don't show up, you won't be in the gunfight and guess what?

You win! In this case, Gordon Collyer showed me how to prevent an accident.

This could have been an accident started a few years ago. I saw a friend flying a Hangar 9 Twist and thought "That's a nice-looking plane and it's pretty aerobatic". So, I bought a used one. Well, this is me we're talking about, so I'll confess. I bought two; both .40 size glow planes. I have no idea of when or where I bought them, but I think they were of the "buy online in a hurry and regret at your leisure" classification. After they spent a few years hanging out in my basement as part of my reserve fleet, I decided to talk Gordon into converting one of them to electric use for me. After all, I had a surplus of 6 Volt, 5,000 mAh batteries lying around and they needed to be put to some use. I



Of course, this rebuild would involve creating a hatch of some sort up front to allow the battery to be changed easily. And that involved removing the Monocoat to expose the woodwork underneath. And that's when Gordon discovered the plane had been crashed. (Or did Gordon say "Trashed"? Maybe that was it.) Several Times, apparently. And repaired, several times, in, to say the least, a rather cavalier fashion.

Let's face it. Someone had wrecked the plane, stuck it back together enough to allow the Monocoat to hide the damage and found a sucker (me) to buy it. Strangely enough, it appears there are some people in our hobby who are less than completely transparent in their dealings with their fellow hobbyists.

But, that's where Gordon saved me from an almost certain accident which would have occurred later on.







We all know Gordon builds nice stuff. He's very talented, very studious and very careful. As he was looking at the hidden damage to the plane's nose, he noticed something amiss with the tail surfaces. Maybe it was just a hunch, maybe the empennages sagged a bit when he picked it up. Whatever it was, he stripped the Monocoat away and found the tail was worse than the nose.



Talk about using toothpicks to brace things; this was worse. One large piece of square balsa rod was only touching at the extreme edges of two points, but had been pressed into service as a brace. The actual area of contact had to be no more than a very small fraction of an inch. And, had he done only what I had asked him to do, the plane wouldn't have survived its first flight after the rebuild. That's the sort of thing to which we all need to pay attention. Thanks, Gordon;

President's Pilot Box: Gordon Collyer Solid-State Ink.

When I was a kid, I got a desk-top printing press as a birthday present. It had rubber type that had to be "set" into small "line trays" and graphics that could be inserted into the "type" field using rubber cement. An "inking" roller pressed against a "type" roller that held the lines of type, and each time the type roller was cranked, black and white 3"x 10" copy was produced. Well, the "inking" process was messy, and 3 pages of copy at 10 cents each for a local "newspaper" didn't pay for more ink. Had I stuck with it, who knows maybe journalism, or better yet Microsoft Word might have been my future. But alas, airplanes soon came along, and any hope of fortune soon was cast away for a life of aerospace engineering and its relative poverty. Now the "poverty" thought takes me to today. For Christmas this year I got a "3d Printer". Like printing ink, you can make a mess melting a lot of filament and have it run all over your work bench trying to tune one of those things. I already have 5 or 6 rolls of different filament and have successfully made "chip bag" clips for my entire extended family and one ex-roommate from college. And do note that "tune" is a relative term. My brother had two 1970's era Alfa Romeos that he could tune every now and then also.

However, before I incur the ire of our resident 3d-printing alchemist, Jim Restel, I must say I am making progress. Much of this progress thanks to Jim and his 3d-printing learning sessions at the Culpeper library. Now I don't think I'll give up on balsa unless I am relegated to an environment where balsa dust and paint fumes are forbidden, but I have gotten far enough along, to see that wheel pants might be a useful outcome



(the picture a pathfinder design experiment).

I am not planning for a whole printed airplane yet. As an exercise I am thinking about printing a wing to use on my 70% Kadet foamboard trainer. As I can understand right now, a proper design and the right, foaming, lite-weight filament (see also "tuning") should produce a wing that is lighter than a balsa and Mono/Ultra-Cote wing, but heavier (and look better) than the foamboard version. The picture is a "test" section to see how things work out from a printing, weight and strength standpoint.



I must admit there is something mesmerizing about drawing out something on the computer while watching a Commanders Game and then having it "rise" up from the print bed and measure precisely to within small fractions of a millimeter of the intended design. And, I have a possible design for an all plastic, printed hatch latch if I can find a plastic/filament that does not fracture when flexed many times. I guess I am due to acquire more filament. The good news is that no matter what, a "springier" plastic will make better chip clips!
